



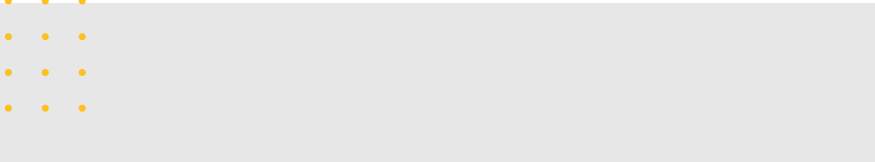

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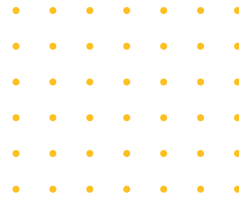
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Message From The President

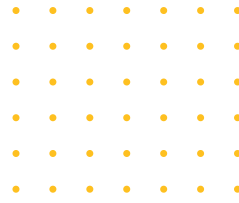

In 2023, the Centre for Injury Prevention and Research, Bangladesh (CIPRB) made significant strides in addressing critical public health challenges through rigorous research, impactful programme implementation, and strengthened collaboration with government agencies, development partners, and our communities.

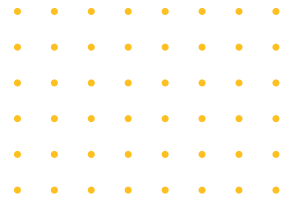

Executive Summary

The Centre for Injury Prevention and Research, Bangladesh (CIPRB) made noteworthy contributions in 2023 through critical health research, large-scale programme interventions, and strengthening national capacity to address major public health challenges.

In 2023, CIPRB's **Health Systems Research Division and Road Traffic Injury Prevention Unit** conducted a nationwide cross-sectional survey, "Bangladesh Health and Injury Survey (BHIS 2023)", to assess all forms of injury-related morbidity, mortality, and disability across the country. The survey estimated approximately 98,422 injury-related deaths annually, which corresponds to about 268 deaths per day. Furthermore, more than 138,000 individuals become permanently disabled each year, averaging about 380 new cases of disability per day.

Reproductive and Child Health Division, implemented 'The End Obstetric Fistula Programme' across Sylhet division. CIPRB complemented to revising the national fistula strategy (2023-2030) and preparation of Annual Report on Obstetric Fistula in Bangladesh to strengthen national coordination and improve early identification and referral.

International Drowning Prevention and Research Division, in 2023, served approximately 610,000 people including 2,639 children in Cox's Bazar under its SeaSafe project. Project Bhasa ensured supervision and Early Childhood Development (ECD) services to 17,793 under five children in 500 Anchal Centres (child care centers). Barguna and Patuakhali districts. In addition, research project "Sonamoni" worked to prevent drowning for under 2-year aged children in two upazilas of Sherpur and Patuakhali districts.

A total of 154 staff (46 female & 108 male) and 5619 paid volunteers (5543 female & 76 male) worked in CIPRB in 2023. The organization prioritized safeguarding issues to protect rights, dignity, safety and security of children, mother and community people as well as staff members in its research and project implementation.

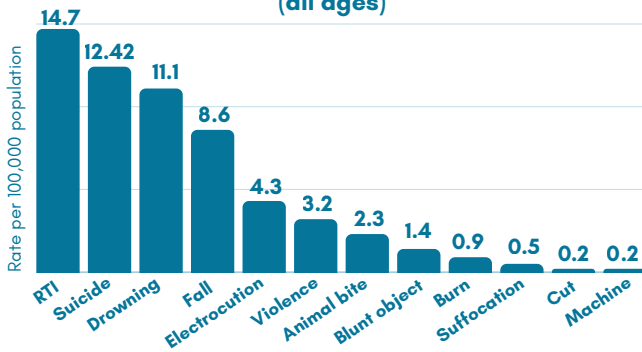


Bangladesh Health and Injury Survey 2023

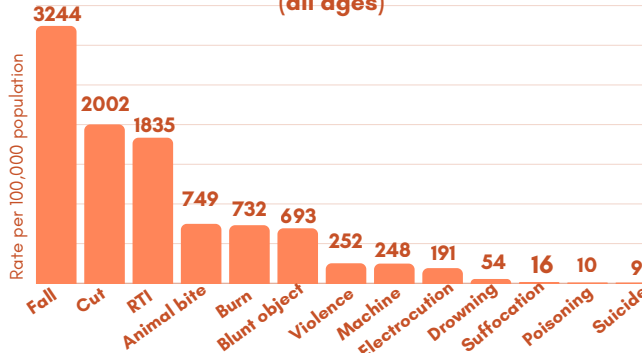
In 2023, CIPRB led the Bangladesh Health and Injury Survey (BHIS 2023), a comprehensive cross-sectional survey in 64 districts. It was conducted in collaboration with the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) and Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS).

BHIS 2023 survey covered >420,000 population from 4,398 households. It included all types of injury-related morbidity, mortality, and disability across the country.

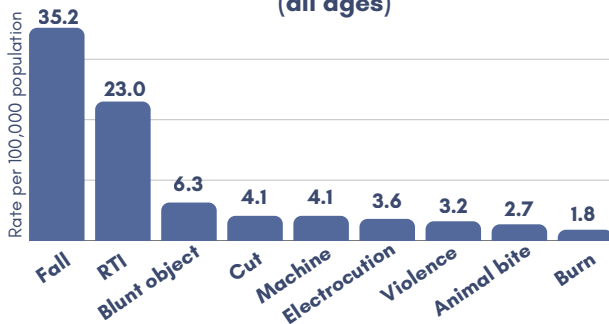
Injury mortality rates by mechanism of Injury (all ages)

Situation Analysis of the Critical Care Health Workforces in Bangladesh in the post-covid-19 Pandemic

For a 'Situation Analysis of the Critical Care Health Workforces in Bangladesh' CIPRB analysed the prevailing Intensive Care Unit (ICU) and High Dependency Unit (HDU) of 40 government hospitals including 8 Medical Colleges from 8 Divisions, and 32 District Hospitals (4 from each division).

Prevention of Mother-to-Child Transmission of HIV and Syphilis

In 2023, CIPRB implemented 'The Prevention of Mother-to-Child Transmission (PMTCT) intervention' with support from UNICEF in Cox's Bazar to reduce the transmission of HIV and Syphilis from mothers to their children in the district.

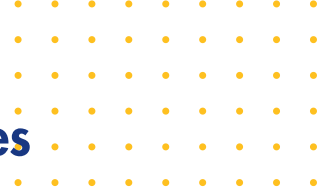

Estimating Hospital Burden of Road Traffic Injuries in Bangladesh

Estimating Hospital Burden of Road Traffic Injuries in Bangladesh' is another important study of CIPRB in 2023 to assess the burden of road traffic injuries on different level of healthcare facilities in Bangladesh. The survey included 285 road traffic injury patients from 83 hospitals from eight divisions of the country. The survey findings can improve capacity development for healthcare facility staff by identifying gaps in emergency response, patient management, and trauma care at different levels. These insights can support targeted training and improve the preparedness of health facilities to manage road traffic injury cases effectively.



Bloomberg Philanthropies Initiative for Global Road Safety

In collaboration with the Bloomberg Philanthropies Initiative for Global Road Safety (BIGRS), CIPRB continued monitoring key road safety behavioural risk factors in Dhaka North and Chattogram City Corporations in 2023. Through standardized observation protocols developed by the Johns Hopkins International Injury Research Unit (JH-IIRU), periodic data collection was carried out in 15 designated locations across five wards in each city. The research focused on three core behavioural indicators: helmet use, seat-belt and child restraint use, and vehicle speeding.

Health and Gender Support Project

In addition, with support from UNICEF, CIPRB's implemented 'Health and Gender Support Project (HGSP)' in Cox's Bazar. A total of 345 groups (batches) training were provided to government health staff, emphasizing essential care for mothers and newborns.



Road Safety Day Observation

CIPRB, in collaboration with the National Heart Foundation of Bangladesh, spearheaded a project aimed to estimate health burden of road traffic injury, strengthening road safety legislation, enhancing capacity, and raising public awareness to address road safety. This initiative aligns with global road safety targets, particularly Sustainable Development Goals (SDG, 3.6 and 11.2), and supports the UN Global Plan for Road Safety.

Major Accomplishments of RCH Division

- Identified **113** fistula cases, referred **105** women, and ensured surgery for **78** women, including outreach in teagarden and haor areas
- Established **four functional fistula corners** at district hospitals
- Completed and submitted the revised **National Fistula Strategy (2023–2030)** for approval to DGHS
- Trained **55 female pharmacists** through entrepreneurship courses and completed pharmacy-level supportive supervision for **135 pharmacists**
- Delivered large-scale emergency support to **32,861** women and girls, ensuring **3,553** skilled births and **4,550** cash transfers under the Northern Flood Response

● End Obstetric Fistula in Bangladesh

CIPRB implemented the 'End Obstetric Fistula Programme' implemented in Sylhet division, with community-level case identification linked to district hospitals equipped with fistula corners. Referral pathways further connect patients to specialized centres beyond the division when advanced surgical care is needed.



Komlaphul Pharmacy Intervention in Bogura & Bagerhat

The Komlaphul Pharmacy Intervention in Bogura and Bagerhat aims to enhance women's access to quality Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) services through a strengthened network of female pharmacists. In 2023, a total of 55 female pharmacists in Bagerhat (29) and Bogura (26) completed the entrepreneurship training, strengthening their competencies in SRHR service delivery and business management. Through supportive supervision, 135 pharmacists, including 32 female pharmacists, received on-site guidance to improve service quality and operational standards.



Maternal and Perinatal Death Surveillance and Response Implementation Support to QIS in five districts

The Maternal and Perinatal Death Surveillance and Response (MPDSR) Implementation Support to Quality Improvement Secretariat (QIS) was implemented in five districts namely Sunamganj, Noakhali, Chandpur, Bandarban, and Dhaka. The project worked to enhance the capacity of health managers and providers to identify preventable maternal and perinatal deaths, analyze contributing factors, and implement timely response actions across SIDA-supported districts. The initiative also aims to support national-level documentation through the development of the Annual Report on MPDSR in Bangladesh 2023 in collaboration with QIS and DGHS.

Through MPDSR implementation support, the programme rolled out video toolkits, conducted district-level workshops, strengthened response plans in 10 districts, and supported MoHFW in quarterly reviews. The annual MPDSR progress report was initiated. During the Northern Flood Response in Sylhet, Netrakona & Sunamganj, over 32,800 women and girls accessed MISP services, 3,553 births were attended by skilled personnel, and 4,550 beneficiaries received mobile-based cash transfers.



Adolescent Youth Central Emergency Response Fund

Adolescent Youth Central Emergency Response Fund (AY-CERF) project aims to strengthen lifesaving SRHR and Gender Based Violence (GBV) services in Netrokona, Sunamganj and Sylhet districts' flood-affected areas.

International Conference



CIPRB shared the research findings on MLBC in two international conferences, i.e., the International Maternal Newborn Health Conference 2023 in Cape Town, South Africa, and International Midwifery Conference 2023 in Bali, Indonesia.

Research

PNC Pre-discharge Counselling study

CIPRB jointly with the Government of Bangladesh and Save the Children International conducted the PNC Pre-discharge Counselling (PDC) study in three upazilas in Noakhali district. The study combined register reviews at selected facilities with a survey through data collection over phone.



Family-Centered Care training manual development

CIPRB developed the Family Centered Care (FCC) training manual with technical support of Save the Children under the guidance of DGHS. The Family-Centred Care (FCC) research produced a nationally aligned training package—developed through expert consultations, workshops, and adherence to WHO guidelines—to support standardized FCC implementation.



Midwife Led Birthing Centres case study in Bangladesh

CIPRB with the support of Burnet Institute, Melbourne, Victoria, Australia conducted Midwife Led Birthing Centres (MLBC), a qualitative research in Rohingya camp, Cox'sBazar. This study aimed to understand the functioning of MLBCs in this humanitarian context from the perspectives of women, midwives, and key stakeholders.

PROJECT Bhasa

CIPRB implemented PROJECT Bhasa in collaboration with the Non-Communicable Disease Control Programme, DGHS, the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI), UK, and the Princess Charlene of Monaco Foundation. The project is being implemented in three upazilas of Patuakhali (Kalapara) and Barguna (Betagi and Taltali) districts under Barishal Division.

From the findings of Bangladesh Health and Injury Survey 2005 and 2016, it was identified that the Barishal Division was the most drowning prone area in the country considering children aged 1-9 years. Bhasa project aimed to reduce child drowning and implemented the evidence-based interventions that were tested in Bangladesh and recommended by the World Health Organization (WHO) in the 'Preventing Drowning: An Implementation Guide (2017)'.

The key components of the project include operating community-based childcare centres, implementing the survival swimming teaching to children, and providing first response training.

Anchal

Anchal, a community child-care centre, aims to prevent drowning and other injuries as well as provides necessary services for early childhood development (ECD). It provides a safe space for 20-25 children of 12- 48 months (1- under 5 years) old from 9 am to 1 pm, the most vulnerable age and time for child drowning. An Anchal is proven as 80% protective from drowning.

SwimSafe

SwimSafe is an initiative to teach survival swimming skills to children aged 6-10 years old. The course teaches children how to swim, float and perform a land-based rescue within a modified pond. SwimSafe programme is recognized by the World Health Organization and proven as 90% protective.

First response training

The First Response training aims to equip community members with essential first aid skills, including cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), to support injured or unwell persons until they receive professional medical care. The initiative is designed to minimize the consequences of injuries, including drowning, and to discourage harmful or inappropriate practices in emergency situations.

The project emphasizes engaging community stakeholders, including the formation of Village and Union level Injury Prevention Committees.

Collaborations

Developing the capacity of other organizations to run swimming lessons:

CIPRB provided training to the South Asia Partnership, Bangladesh (SAP-Bangladesh) in Barguna on 4-10 June 2023 to develop survival swimming teaching skills along with conducting drowning prevention awareness sessions. Following the training, in 2023, SAP Bangladesh covered swimming teaching to 646 children (363 girls and 283 boys)



Crèches for Child Health and Safety (CreCHeS)

CIPRB has been implementing CreCHeS project in collaboration with Johns Hopkins University and ICDDR,B and with the support of Bloomberg Philanthropies across seven upazilas in Sirajganj, Sherpur, Narsingdi, Chandpur, and Cumilla districts.

In 2012 the project began as Saving of Lives from Drowning (SoLiD) in Bangladesh. Evaluation after two years showed that Anchal effectively prevents drowning among children aged 1-4 years. Following that finding, Drowning Prevention Partners initiated nationwide scale-up of Anchal activities. Anchal is a community-based crèche where trained caregivers supervise 1 to under 5 children six days a week from 9am to 1pm, providing early childhood development services, socialisation and health and hygiene education. Regular meetings through UIPCs (Union Injury Prevention Committees) and VIPCs (Village Injury Prevention Committees) help raise community awareness and support injury prevention activities.

Transition to Government Ownership and Sustainability

The Government of Bangladesh initiated the Integrated Community Based Center for Child Care, Protection and Swim-Safe Facilities (ICBC) Project to scale up the drowning prevention and childcare interventions nationally. CIPRB contributed technically to the development of the ICBC Development Project Proposal (DPP), while 2,299 CreCHeS centres were approved for transition to Bangladesh Shishu Academy (BSA) under the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs (MoWCA), marking an important step toward sustainability and government ownership.

Cox's Bazar

Since 2014, CIPRB has been implementing SeaSafe Project, with support from the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) in Cox's Bazar, renowned for having the world's longest natural sea beach, a popular tourist destination and a high-risk area for drowning. SeaSafe Project has strengthened lifesaving efforts by establishing Bangladesh's first professional lifeguard service alongside school-based awareness programmes.

SeaSafe Project delivers professional dawn-to-dusk lifeguard coverage across three beaches, while integrating swimming education, youth engagement, and community-based water safety awareness. In 2023, the project served a total of 645,726 people including children, teachers, tourists and locals on swimming lessons, key messages along with rescue operations.

In January 2023, SeaSafe Project conducted a risk mapping and stakeholder mapping workshop, to identify high drowning risk areas of Cox's Bazar and Ramu and relevant stakeholders such as District administration, UNO office, locals community leaders and volunteers who are crucial to the project. In addition, SeaSafe Project provided first responder training to total of 100 participants including tourist police, gram police, education officer, journalist, school teachers, community volunteers, social worker, and child caregiver to strengthen their capacity and preparedness to effectively respond to drowning incidents as first responders.

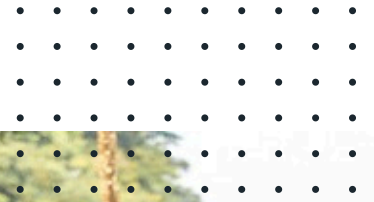

2022 - Ongoing Sherpur, Patuakhali

In 2022, CIPRB initiated the research “Sonamoni Project” to prevent drowning for under 2-year aged children in rural areas with financial support from the National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR), UK. The project is implementing in two upazilas of Sherpur and Patuakhali districts.

For implementation, Bournemouth University (UK), coordinates the project in collaboration with University of the West of England, University of Southampton, the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) and Design without Borders (DwB) Africa.

In 2023, the project organized five workshops across 12 drowning-prone villages in Kalapara (Patuakhali) and Sherpur Sadar (Sherpur) for planning, and relevant information collection, exploring risk factors, caregivers perceptions of injury hazards around their households.

Goal

To develop a sustainable (acceptable, feasible, affordable) and scalable intervention to reduce the burden of drowning for newly mobile infants under 2 years old in Bangladesh.



Objectives

- Explore existing supervision practices of under 2 years old children.
- Identify, establish and prioritise solutions that best address the gaps in current drowning prevention interventions.
- Using HCD principles and processes, co-design intervention prototypes within the solutions.
- Pilot-produced interventions to evaluate effectiveness, adoption, and maintenance of the interventions, and assess feasibility.
- Share findings and lessons learned from the research and finalise in line with the developed sustainable exit strategy.

Research

FloodSafe: Improving Access to Care for Medical Emergencies during Flood Disasters in Bangladesh

To enhance emergency medical care during floods, Bangladesh government agencies and CIPRB collaborate with German partners in the "FlutNetz" project. A mixed-method study was conducted in flood-prone Jamalpur district to assess the baseline status on access to care, and knowledge, attitude and practice (KAP) of community people on emergency first aid measures, and identified needs for improvement, and developed interventions.

In 2023, during the baseline survey, 2,103 household respondents were interviewed on their knowledge and practice of emergency care during flood in addition to surveying 72 health facilities.

Debate competition on Drowning Prevention:

A nationwide parliamentary style debate competition was organised by CIPRB in collaboration with Dhaka University Debating Club from 21-25 July'23. It was an extensive gathering of 300 debaters in 96 teams from 32 schools, 32 colleges and 32 universities. Around 70% debate motions were on child injury, especially child drowning.



National Seminar to accelerate approval of national Drowning Prevention strategy:

CIPRB organized a seminar on 24 July'23 to celebrate the first ever DP resolution adoption by the World Health Assembly. Speakers opined the urgency of collaborative actions of concerned ministries and other organisations to accelerate drowning prevention movement.

Baseline Assessment of Mental Health Services and Inception Meetings in Six Districts of Bangladesh

In Bangladesh, the prevalence of mental health disorders is 13.6% among children (7–17 years), and 16.8% among adults, referring to a high burden of the problem. To address the growing mental health challenges in providing services in Bangladesh, CIPRB, with technical assistance from WHO Bangladesh conducted the first baseline assessment of mental health service provision in four selected districts of Bangladesh in 2022, as well as developed a monitoring and evaluation framework for further implementation research.

On 26 November 2023, a consultative workshop on ‘Baseline Assessment of Mental Health Services and inception meetings in six districts of Bangladesh’ was held at DGHS. The stakeholders discussed project activities and shared their recommendations.

Safeguarding Audit

Mr. Matthew Beaumont, International Business and Performance Manager and Ms. Anthi Minhinnick, Designated Safeguarding Lead of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI), UK visited CIPRB head office and field offices, Barishal and Cox's Bazar, during 19-23 March 2023. In a meeting with RNLI, CIPRB safeguarding focal Sangeeta Barua presented safeguarding implementation updates and future plans to strengthen the best practices.



Training on Safeguarding

CIPRB conducted Training of Trainers (ToT) on organizational safeguarding policy and procedures in Dhaka on 14 March 2023 for selected staff from different projects. In addition, CIPRB organized a three-day refresher training for 44 staff from Patuakhali and Barguna districts during 1-3 October 2023.


